## The Legend of Patrick Sinclair

Patrick Sinclair entered the British army as an ensign in the 2nd battalion, 42nd highlanders in 1758. After service in the colonies he returned to England and was promoted to captain. In 1775 he received the appointment of Lieutenant Governor of Michilimackinac. Upon landing in New York however Sinclair was taken prisoner under suspicion of organizing the Indians against the colonies. He returned to England, and did not arrive at Michilimackinac until 1779.

Amazingly despite these inauspicious beginnings, Patrick Sinclair became the most important man on the upper Great Lakes.

During Lt. Gov. Sinclair's tenure at Mackinac, the fort and village were transferred from their location near Mackinaw City to the present location here on the Island. Fear of American rebels prompted the move to the defensible bluff above the town. Patrick Sinclair, who supervised the move across ice in winter and by ship in the summer months, is really the founder of the community here today. He occupied himself with the British war effort, and spent a fortune outfitting the Indians for war and supplying food and clothing for their families. He was eventually charged with financial mismanagement and forced to relinquish his command. Twice he went to debtor's prison. He died in Lybster in 1820, at that time the oldest officer of his rank in the British army.

So raise your glass and give a cheer to the man whose legend created this fine pub.
